## *2 Town gardens*

1 Ford Street - Sheryl & Ray McLennan

Relax as you meander around winding paths and curved garden beds. Enjoy the tranquility of many ponds and water features. A garden that is forever changing with quirky elements throughout lush plantings of large trees and shrubs.

“Harry Jarvis Wing” - Holbrook Hospital

The Harry Jarvis Wing was opened in November 1989. The original trees were planted by some members of the Hospital board. The garden was commenced by members of the Auxiliary in the early years. It has been extended and maintained by staff members and volunteers. Rotary and Lions Club established further gardens and the Rotunda. The Auxiliary have provided the water feature, roses and many of the plants. Over the years, many people have provided plants, cutting and seedlings. Vicki Stevens designed some of the gardens and pathways. Today, the gardens provide a talking piece and relaxing environment for all to enjoy at the Holbrook Health Service.

After the extensions are completed in 2015, we envisage a wall garden and a sensory garden.

## *1 Farm garden*

“Annandale South” Annandale Rd - Anne & Andrew Hicks

The house and garden at “Annandale South” are 24 years old. Two Blakeley's Red Gums frame the view across the farm to Mt Narra Narra. John Cox built the 118 metre long dry stone retaining wall that extends across the front of the garden. Behind the house the garden is bordered by a long row of lemon scented gums. Over the years the garden has evolved with succulents and other low water use plants. There are several crab apple “loensis”, weeping apples, quince, apricot, apple, citrus trees, plus plane trees. Beyond the house and garden there is an area that has been planted with native trees and shrubs, with a path leading down to a dam.

# THE PERPETUAL TROPHY

## The Maud Clyde & Willa Nolan Trophy

Donated by Mrs. Beverley Cottrell.

Mrs Maud Catherine Clyde (1882 – 1968) was a foundation member of the St Paul's Guild and the Mother's Union, a Sunday School teacher and secretary of the Flower Show for eleven years.

She was the first woman to sit on Parish Council and took many prizes for her roses and scones.

Mrs Willa Mordred Nolan (1906 – 1991) also served the Sunday School and Mother's Union, and also held position of Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer of the Guild.

Mrs Nolan was Parish organist for 40 years and played for a further 26 years after moving to Albury.

Mrs Nolan was secretary of the Flower Show for a long period.

Mrs Beverley Cottrell is the daughter of Willa Nolan and granddaughter of Maud Clyde. The trophy is awarded each year to the most successful exhibitor in classes A, B, C, and E, and is accompanied by a cash prize of \$50.

## GENERAL RULES

### Please Read the Schedule Carefully.

1. Stewards will be in attendance from 7.30am the morning of the show to receive exhibits. **All entries must be ready by 9.50am and be displayed by 10am, ready for judging.**

### Judging for all classes commences at 10.00am.

2. **If Exhibitors need help with their displays, please bring a willing friend to help, if possible. The Stewards will be available for direction and placement of exhibits.**
3. Decision of the judges will be final.
4. No charge will be made for the entry of any exhibit.
5. Exhibitors should obtain entry tickets prior to the morning of the show if possible.
6. Exhibitors in Class A and in Class B are to arrange their exhibits in the bottles provided and to affix the entry ticket to the bottle. These are then presented to the Stewards for display.
7. All flowers exhibited must be grown within an 80km radius of Holbrook and by the exhibitor, except in the decorative classes C and D.
8. All exhibits must be natural (not artificial) unless stated otherwise.

10. Points to determine the most successful exhibitor in any class will be awarded as follows:

Best Exhibit of each Class	15 points.
First Place	10 points.
Second Place	5 points.

No points will be awarded to section winners with only one entry. Certificates will be awarded to First and Second place winners in all sections of each class.
11. Exhibits must not be removed before 3.00pm, unless by special arrangement with the steward of the appropriate class.

### DEFINITIONS:

Distinct = Different. Bloom = One cut, one flower.  
Cut = One stem, any number of flowers.  
Container = Minimum of six flowers.

## CLASS A CUT FLOWERS

Each cut of flower to be in a separate large bottle with entry ticket attached.

\* Each to be in a separate green "Cascade" bottle with entry ticket attached.

1. 1 Cut Bearded Iris – Dark.
2. 1 Cut Bearded Iris – Light.
3. Collection of 6 bearded Iris, distinct colours.
4. 1 Cut Iris – any other variety.
5. 3 Flowering shrubs, NOT Australian Native. Max. height 60cm.
6. 3 Flowering Australian Native Shrubs. Max. height 60cm.
7. Container of Flowers – one variety.
8. Container of Flowers – distinct varieties.
9. 1 Cut Flower – any variety.
10. 3 cuts Flowers – distinct varieties.
11. 6 cuts Flowers – distinct varieties.
12. 3 Pansies on a dish/saucer that is covered with foil.
13. \* 6 Sweet Peas – distinct colours.
14. \* 6 Poppies – any variety.
15. \* 1 Geranium / Pelargonium. (smaller containers may be used if stems are short)
16. \* 3 Geraniums / Pelargoniums. (smaller containers may be used if stems are short)
17. \* 6 cuts of Bulbs/Tubers/Corms.
18. \* 1 Cut Columbine/Aquilegia.
19. \* 3 Cuts of Columbine/Aquilegia (in 3 separate bottles)
20. \* 1 Calendula.
21. Container of Calendulas.
22. 1 Arum Lily – any variety.

## HINTS

To help you to prepare and stage your entries attractively and increase your chance of success.

- **Follow the rules as closely as you can – for instance if the rules say ‘in a vase’ or ‘in a bottle’ that is what you must use.**
- **Take the same care when entering for children.**
- **‘Container’ means any vessel (see especially Class B).**
- **Floral artwork, especially for tables, should be decorative from all angles – not just from the front.**
- **An entry for “one rose” means that no buds should be attached to the stem because it is counted as another flower. They must have 1 set of leaves attached to the stem.**
- **Generally speaking, a vase is a container that is taller than its width.**
- **Present Roses and Flowers “facing the judge”.**
- **Notes for Roses:**  
**HT = Hybrid tea Rose.**  
**Variety = same name of Rose eg: “Mr Lincoln”.**  
**Type = HT, Floribunda, Single petalled, Old Fashioned, David Austin, Miniature, Bush, Climbing etc.**

**- Most important -**

- **Please place a sticker with your name under your container. It saves a lot of work and worry, after the Show, to know who owns a cherished but forgotten vessel.**

1. 6 Roses – distinct varieties.
2. 3 Roses of the same variety.
3. 3 Roses – distinct varieties.
4. Rose in 3 stages – Bud to Bloom (bud to show some colour).
5. 1 Rose –Light Colour.
6. 1 Rose –Dark Colour.
7. 1 Old Fashioned/David Austin Rose.
8. 1 Cut Single Petalled Rose (1 stem, any number of flowers & buds).
9. 1 Cut Floribunda Rose (1 stem, any number of flowers & buds).
10. Container of HT Roses (any variety, any colour)
11. Container of Old Fashioned/David Austin Roses. (any variety, any colour)
12. Container of Floribunda Roses. (any variety, any colour)
13. Container of Miniature Roses. (any variety, any colour)
14. Container of Roses – any type, variety or colour.
